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

As soon as we landed in Rome, we took a train to Venice and stayed there for a couple of days enjoying the city and traveling to the islands of Murano and Burano. We witnessed glass blowing and lace making. Our next stop was Florence

where we were awed by the Duomo, beautiful artwork and sculptures and of course Michaelangelo's David.



It would be an understatement to say that the world was surprised when the British journalist, Malcolm Muggeridge, was received into the Catholic Church in 1982. The son of agnostic parents, Muggeridge had inherited from his father the conviction that man was capable of building paradise on earth. Although he briefly considered Christianity during his studies at Cambridge, his interest in socialism was far deeper. He once wrote, "I am a socialist because I believe that the right conditions help man to be good, and only collectivism creates such good conditions." In 1927, Muggeridge married Kitty Dobbs, who was also a socialist and a religious agnostic. They were proud to establish a marriage free of religious constraints.

In the early 1930s, Muggeridge's career brought him to the Soviet Union, where he witnessed first-hand the true barbarism of communism. Little by little, his disillusionment led him to reject the conviction that the answers to man's longings and man's problems lay in socialism. He began to read the great works of Dostoevsky and Tolstoy, to occasionally attend Mass and to again consider the idea of entering the Catholic Church. However, almost 40 years would pass before he would find the courage to take that step. While many different experiences converged to make that happen, the deciding factor was his meeting with St. Teresa of Calcutta (Mother Teresa), about whom he wrote the book, Something Beautiful for God.

St. Teresa was clearly a woman whose life had been transformed by Jesus Christ, and it was impossible for Muggeridge not to be attracted by the witness of faith, hope, and love which he saw in her. In all of her simplicity, she radiated Jesus to such a degree that Muggeridge was compelled to embrace the Christian faith, becoming a devout Catholic, and

one of the Church's staunchest defenders. In their last years, Malcolm and Kitty Muggeridge cultivated a deep love for the Blessed Sacrament, spent their days praying and attending Mass, and preparing themselves to come face-to-face with their Savior.

It was because St. Teresa had allowed herself to be transformed by her encounters with Jesus that Malcolm Muggeridge was able to write of her: "Mother Teresa's total devotion to Christ, her conviction that everyone must be treated, helped, and loved as if he were Christ himself; her simple life lived according to the Gospel and her joy in receiving the sacraments – none of this can be ignored. There is no book I have read, no speech I have heard ... there is no human relationship, or transcendental experience that has brought me closer to Christ, or made me more aware of what the Incarnation means, and what is demanded of us." Hopefully, our lives are changed and transformed by knowing Jesus. If so, what happened to Malcolm Muggeridge can also happen to many others by the Holy Spirit working through us.



#### **CORAGGIO!**

Considering the topic for this issue, I polled the members of our committee who encouraged comments on the retention of Columbus Day. This topic may be overstated but important enough to repeat and repeat....

As our heritage and traditions are being challenged we must stand firm and not be deterred from our quest.

Columbus Day is an exclusive day of celebrating our heritage and in his defense, Richard Caifano, a

committee member, states "slavery was practiced long before Columbus arrived on this continent" and that "although imperfect a man, his accomplishments deserve recognition". "Imperfect?" Can we consider Washington or Jefferson "Perfect"? That doesn't apply to any man. There are imperfections in us all!

Jean Cannavo writes of the great achievements of Italians and their descendants who ventured across the world, which tell stories of highly intelligent and creative people, Columbus included. We cannot underestimate the beauty and benefit of art, science, literature and creative thinking which greatly improved not only their lives, but the lives of those who would follow, and which still stand as a testament to their ingenu-

It is our duty to defend our heritage and the tradition of celebrating

Columbus Day and the month of October as "Italian Heritage" month. Let us join forces to speak out, write and "sing" of our ancestors' achievements to show our pride in all we have inherited.

There are those who wish to destroy our "spirit" by expounding the "negative". We must be courageous, steadfast and diligent in proclaiming the "positive"! We can no longer remain complacent!

We can celebrate with others... What Italian doesn't like to celebrate???...but we cannot let them destroy our traditions. Only WE can preserve them!

Although October has already passed let's prepare for 2018. The NEA started planning their attack years in advance. Shall we stand by and accept it, or do we fight back????

All submissions that make the deadline should appear in the ComUNICO there are some exceptions especially when the photos are not of good quality or the content is not directly related to UNICO.

Times change and we change with them. I'm sure we can all agree that "living things" must change in order to remain viable. Of course our objective is to initiate responsible change. As the Scholarship Program continues to expand, a true affirmation of our purpose, it also brings increased responsibility to our Chapters. In the interest of alleviating what may be considered an unfair burden on our members, research was conducted to determine a reasonable solution. After careful analysis of alternatives, with input from Scholarship Committee members, it was decided to streamline our procedure by updating application submission to an online process.

Candidates, directed to the UNICO Na-

tional website, will be able to click on a link to access and complete applications. Chapters will still have the opportunity to serve as sponsor and/or present a letter of recommendation, if they wish. The Chapter representative would provide their candidates with an email address to be sent on to SmarterSelect, the online agency. SmarterSelect will contact the representative to advise them of the request and enable a response. Confidentiality will be respected.

Information, detailing the updated procedure, will be emailed by early December to UNICO Executives, District Governors, Chapter Presidents, and Scholarship Chairs. All are asked to work with our members to ensure that potential candidates are aware of UNICO scholarship opportunities and our newly implemented application process. Anyone requiring assistance is encouraged to contact a member of the Scholarship Committee or the National Office. Hard copies cannot be accepted.

Now for other positive changes... We are introducing new offerings. The Inserra Scholarships will grant two awards, valued at \$2,500 each, to students currently

attending an accredited campus based college/university in the United States pursuing a degree. We extend sincere appreciation to Mr. Lawrence Inserra, a member of the Ramsey Chapter, for choosing to sponsor this important program through UNICO. The Eleanor and Anthony De Francis Scholarships for Natural Sciences are available to matriculated students currently attending, full time, the California Institute of Technology, the Massachusetts Institute of Technology, or the School of Astronomical Studies, University of Arizona, Tucson majoring in the Natural Sciences. These scholarships are valued in the range of \$5,000 to \$9,000. Through the efforts of Queensboro Chapter member Joseph Bonventre, this program is available through UNICO National. Mille grazie Joe. We are grateful for your commitment. Also, the Maria and Paolo Alessio Southern Italy Scholarship will be increased to \$2,500. We thank Dr. John Alessio and the members of the Alessio family for sponsoring this highly valued program.

Yes, times change. And as we change with them, we continue to move forward. This is called progress.



The Committee, consisting of Frank Blasi, PA; Elvse Buonomo, NJ; Frank Caperino, CA; Lou DiRico, NY; Grace Gynn, NJ; Lisa Pizzella, NJ, and I are dedicated to continuing the work started by Past Chair Marilyn Nasello and are looking to expand UNICO's digital footprint. Social media networks are fun and interesting ways to connect and communicate. People are living their lives online now more than ever. We need to capitalize on this on both a local and national level to share information about UNICO to the community at large.


Our first target was growing National's presence on Facebook. By constructing a game plan for the UNICO National Facebook page, we were able to increase page views by 76% and engage over 1,700 people in one month. These followers are engaged and interested and are sharing our information with their personal networks. A basic guideline was established - including daily posts, updates on President Vaughan's travels and promoting only National sponsored activities. This keeps the page fresh and relevant to all who visit. Positive feedback has been received for our efforts. One issue we have encountered is the names of some individual Facebook Pages. We are asking all Chapters and Districts to rename their pages to eliminate the "UNICO National" in front (ie. Change UNICO National Waterbury Chapter to Waterbury UNICO). This will help us avoid confusion when someone is searching for UNICO National.

If your Chapter doesn't have a Facebook page, we encourage you to start one. Trust us - your audience (of all

ages) IS on Facebook. You should be too. It's a free and easy way to get information out to the public. Facebook moves quickly. Updating daily keeps you visible to your followers. Facebook allows you to promote fundraisers to a larger population. The nonprofit sector has an established presence on Facebook. People are looking to support causes and important issues. You need to be present and active, however, to give them the opportunity. They don't call it a social network for nothing. With every post, sharable content allows you to reach more people. Every person who sees your post has the ability to share it with dozens, if not hundreds of others.









- All articles and captions are to be submitted in Times New Roman font, 11 point font size and in black.


- 6. Photo File Name should be identifiable to the corresponding caption.



# Team PLAYER

Italian shooting guard Marco Belinelli joined the Atlanta Hawks in September, his 8th team in 10 years in the NBA. Ask him what it's been like to change coaches, teammates and homes so many times, and his answer is matter of

"I've never been someone who is scared of change," he says. "I've had opportunities each place I've been to build good relationships with teammates. I just want to win and be happy where I am. At the end of the day, you do what you love, and you try to do it in the best way that vou can."

At 6'5" and 210 lbs., Belinelli, now 31, started playing basketball at age 6 because his brother was a big fan of the sport — and he's never looked back.

"I love basketball because I love to shoot the ball, I love the competition," he says. "It's brought me a lot of great things in my life — winning the championship in San Antonio, winning the three-point contest at the All-Star game. I try to get better every year. I just love playing the game."

Belinelli began playing professionally in Italy at age 16, and three years later he won the Lega Basket Serie A title with Fortitudo.

"It was just a different level of basketball," he says of Lega Basket. "While it was different, at the same time my focus was to become an NBA player."

He was selected in the first round of the 2007 NBA draft by the Golden State Warriors, and started with a veritable "bang" a week later by scoring 37 points in his first NBA Summer League game. That performance tied for second in the league's four-year history.

Two years later, he was traded to the Toronto Raptors and in 2010 he was traded to the New Orleans Hornets. He

became a restricted free agent after the 2010-11 season and opted to stay with the Hornets another year.

He signed with the Chicago Bulls in 2012, and the team made the second round of the 2013 NBA playoffs. He then signed with the San Antonio Spurs in



2013, scoring a career-high 32 points in January 2014 in a game the team ended up losing to the New York Knicks.

"It's not easy to lose, and I'm really hard on myself sometimes," he says. "But at the same time, it's just a basketball game. I'm trying to play hard and have fun, and just compete."

San Antonio won the 2014 NBA Finals, and Belinelli became the first Italian player to win an NBA championship. That year he also was the first Italian

player to win the three-point contest at the NBA All-Star Weekend.

"I'm really proud of those accomplishments," he says. "I feel like I won the NBA championship for my country, for my city, for my people, my family, my friends. It was a great moment."

Before joining the Hawks, he spent a year with the Sacramento Kings followed by one with the Charlotte Hornets.

Looking back, he says, he really enjoyed his time in Chicago and San Anto-

"Those places and the people I met in those places taught me to be a better player and a better person. They were both great experiences," he says.

Known as a good offensive player and shooter who needs to get better on defense, he's constantly working to improve his game, he says. And he believes in always playing aggressively.

"That's the most important thing," he says. "I've usually come off the bench in my NBA career. I love to play team basketball. Whether I'm scoring or not, my approach is just to be aggressive all the time."

As for his goals after basketball, well, he hasn't thought much about them, he admits.

"Have a couple of kids, have a family," he ventures. "Be happy and safe."

# The people's POPE

If you seek the key that unlocks the door to Pope Francis' soul, look no further than his name.

Cardinal Jorge Mario Bergoglio was elected pope on the second day and the fifth ballot of the 2013 papal conclave following the resignation of his predecessor, Pope Benedict XVI. It was more than just a stunning development that almost no Vatican prognosticators saw coming, it also sparked a series of firsts for the papacy.

The Argentina-born Bergoglio became the first Jesuit priest to lead the Catholic Church, the first from the Americas, the first from the Southern Hemisphere and, perhaps most notable, the first in more than 1,000 years to bypass all the names previously held by his predecessors.

Born in Buenos Aires to Italian parents, Bergoglio embraced the name of another Italian, St. Francis of Assisi, when

he became the Holy Father on March 13, 2013. After his election, Francis stepped out onto the papal balcony dressed in a simple white cassock, black lace-up orthopedic shoes for chronic sciatica and the iron crucifix he wore as Archbishop of Buenos Aires. Nowhere to be seen were the gold crosses, red loafers and ornate vestments that have symbolized the Church's power and affluence for centuries. Instead, Francis, has chosen to align his papacy and his Church with the teachings of St. Francis, a once-wealthy merchant who spurned a life of extravagance in favor of serving the poor and less fortunate as a priest.

In the days following his elevation, Francis spoke openly with reporters about his nervousness during the final vote of conclave, when it became clear he would be elected pope, as well as the efforts of his old friend Brazilian Archbishop Claudio Hummes to put the momentous occasion

into perspective.

Amid the applause and celebration by the College of Cardinals, Hummes "hugged me, he kissed me and he said, 'Don't forget about the poor,'" Francis recalled.

As the 265th successor to St. Peter, Francis said he felt the word "poor" lodge into his brain at that very moment.

"It was then that I thought of St. Francis. And then I thought of wars and about peace and that's how the name came to me— a man of peace, a poor man... and how I would like a church of the poor, for the poor," Francis said.

Nearly five years later, the now 80-year-old pontiff has cut a towering figure in the public consciousness and helped the Catholic Church chart a new course after periods of scandal and institutional strife. Francis took the reins of a church that was losing adherents and influence, especially in parts of Europe and the United States, and has begun a campaign to instill humility and maybe even a touch of modernity into the storied institution. He has spoken passionately — and regularly — about social justice, caring for the poor, becoming better stewards of the environment and the dangers of unchecked capitalism.

Make no mistake, Francis is no revolutionary. To call him that would be to suc-Continues on page 64 ... cumb to a misunderstanding of his papal mission. While not as dogmatic as his predecessors, he still upholds and encourages the most central tenets of Catholicism, even those some view as stubbornly at odds with a 21st century world. Rather, Francis is more an evolutionary leader who acknowledges mankind's unsteady and unsure march toward the future, and, like so many of his flock, grapples in realtime with how to balance tradition with change, and how faith and spirituality can serve as a guiding light in that journey.

"In Francis there is a more realistic approach to the existence of real people, a less ideological take on moral issues that now are framed in the complexity of concrete situations," Dr. Massimo Faggioli, a papal scholar and theology professor Villanova University, told The Christian Science Monitor. "Many priests have always done that, but not many bishops and popes."

Does this make Pope Francis a controversial figure? It depends on who you ask.

Francis has been unafraid to wade into politics and has gone so far as to take on heads of government during his tenure, most publicly U.S. President Donald Trump for his stances on immigration and climate change. The latter issue represents a major plank of the pontiff's advocacy. Before becoming a Jesuit in 1960, he worked as a chemist and has spoken many times of the importance and need for scientific discovery as a means to understand the divine.

With climate change, Francis sees a problem as urgent for humanity as war and famine. To that end, he has reportedly lobbied German Chancellor Angela Merkel to strongly defend the 2015 Paris climate accord in the face of a likely U.S. withdrawal from the agreement. Moreover, he focused a papal encyclical that same year on the importance of governments, corporations and global citizens coming together to address what he calls "a disturbing warming," and has harshly criticized climate change doubters.

"Those who deny this must go to the scientists and ask them. They speak very clearly," Francis told reporters in September 2017. "These aren't opinions pulled out of thin air. They are very clear."

Proponents of a more liberal approach

to church dogma may be encouraged by Francis' talk on climate change, women's rights, his anti-capital punishment stance, and even his softening of the church's positions on divorce and homosexuality.

"A pastor cannot feel that it is enough simply to apply moral laws ... as if they were stones to throw at people's lives," Francis wrote in a 2015 paper on the changing notion of family in today's world. "By thinking that everything is black and white, we sometimes close off the way of grace and growth."



But when it comes to other social issues, Francis remains a tightrope walker of sorts, hewing closely to many of the church's long-held beliefs while trying to strike a more open, accepting viewpoint.

He most notably said of gay men and women, "If a person is gay and seeks God and has good will, who am I to judge?" but has spoken out against same-sex marriage on several occasions. He is also truly a pro-life pontiff, opposing both the death penalty and abortion in no uncertain terms. Nevertheless, he has left the door open for those seeking absolution from a church that once levied excommunications as the only recourse.

"There is no sin that God's mercy cannot reach and wipe away when it finds a repentant heart seeking to be reconciled with the Father," Francis wrote in a 2016 apostolic letter that permanently extended the rights to forgive abortion to all priests.

With more than 1.2 billion Roman Catholics around the globe, and more than 40 percent of them now residing in Latin America, Francis is tasked with leading a church more diverse than at any point in its history, and his unique background makes him an ideal shepherd for this unique moment.

As an Italian raised in Argentina, much of Francis' early life was about building bridges of understanding between groups and cultures. His father, an accountant named Mario, escaped Italian fascism and settled in Buenos Aires, where he married Regina, a fellow Italian natively born in the South American country to parents also hailing from northern Italy. As a Jesuit priest and later as Archbishop of Buenos Aires, Francis focused heavily on ministering to the poor, doubling the number of

priests in the city's most at-risk communities, and imposing strict fiscal discipline on an archdiocese that had become spendthrift. He also made great strides toward increased interfaith dialogue, regularly bringing together leaders representing the Christian, Jewish and Muslim faiths in an effort to find common ground. He has even expressed furthering the Church's outreach to nonbelievers, not to evangelize but instead as a means to solve today's most pressing problems.

"My wish is that the dialogue between us should help to build bridges connecting all people, in such a way that everyone can see in the other not

an enemy, not a rival, but a brother or sister to be welcomed and embraced," Francis said

Perhaps Francis' most radical action has been how swiftly and resolutely he's brought Catholicism, along with the papacy, back down to earth, to make it more humble and Christ-like.

Francis eschews the opulent papal residence for a sparse two-room domicile on the Vatican grounds; he visits prisons on Holy Thursday and washes the feet of inmates; and regularly mingles warmly and comfortably among crowds of pilgrims, devotees and tourists. Jesus never lived in a world of iPhones, but if he did, there is no doubt he too would pose for selfies with excited fans like this pope does.

In a surprise 2017 TED talk — yes, like Steve Jobs and Malcolm Gladwell, this pope has given a TED talk — Francis summed up his hope, not just for his stewardship of the Catholic Church, but for influencers everywhere.

"Please, allow me to say it loud and clear: The more powerful you are, the more your actions will have an impact on people, the more responsible you are to act humbly," he said.

# Real-life SUPERHEROES



Little did he know that the sessions would light up Facebook and inspire other parents to call for an encore.

their shared struggles: The nine-year-old Salt Lake City boy is awaiting a heart transplant because he has half a heart.

Rossi took time to tell Lou&A about the Justice League project, how it might serve as a foundation for his future efforts, and how growing up in Florence attuned him to the arresting power of visual art.

Lou&A: Tell us a bit about your Italian background.

Josh Rossi: I was born in Florence and my dad is fully Italian; my mom is American. I grew up in Italy for the first six years, have been back and lived there on and off. My grandma and a few uncles still live there.

Lou&A: When you look back on your upbringing, how do you feel it prepared you for pursuing a creative profession?

Rossi: When I grew up I was always fascinated with art. My parents would always tell me that I came from Florence, "the city where art was born." They would tell me about all of the Italians who did amazing things and instilled a certain confidence in me. So I felt a sense of pride being a Florentine and I think that affected my passion for art. As an adult I still have that pride and get inspiration from old masters such as Michelangelo and Botticelli, who created fantastical worlds with their art.

Lou&A: Many dads and moms help their kids assemble Halloween costumes that can get elaborate and might cost \$100 or more. But \$1,500? Did people around you think you were crazy?

Rossi: The Wonder Woman shoot with my daughter Nellee was for Halloween 2016 — and I wanted to go all out on the costume because that's what I normally do with my high-production photo shoots. The purpose wasn't to spoil my daughter or be excessive but to make a statement to the world: that we should teach our daughters to find their worth and strength from within, and not just from external beauty. People responded very well and

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there were only a few who didn't understand the purpose — mainly because they just read the headlines and not the actual People article that explained everything.

Lou&A: How did your photo shoot go viral, and what was your reaction to that? How then did you put two and two together and decide to start shooting kids who had illnesses and other difficulties?

Rossi: It went viral after influential people posted it on Facebook. After that, other media companies contacted me that wanted to create stories around it. And I got the idea for the Justice League photo shoot after getting messages from many people who said their daughter or son was a real superhero. It gave my wife Roxana and I the idea to create a new series where we would find those superheroes in society — and that would be kids who struggle.

Lou&A: At a certain point, this project took on a life that stemmed far beyond your orchestration. What has been the most moving or affecting aspect of the superhero sessions for you?

Rossi: The most moving part of these

photo shoots has been the reaction of the public. I've received hundreds of emails from people who say they're inspired to either spend more time with their daughter or ask how they can create something similar for sick kids in their own community. My favorite part of all the photo shoots has been the reaction of the kids to the large prints we provided to them. They were so excited and happy to receive them. The highlight of the media exposure for me was to get interviewed by actual doctors on Italy's RAI Italian Television recently about the shoot and the impact it had on the kids.

Lou&A: Is there a thought to turn this work into something even more inspiring and ambitions?

Rossi: This is an ongoing project where I'll search for the next cause I can help support by doing creative photo shoots and raising awareness. At the moment, the photo sessions are enough because I don't want to violate the copyright of any company I've associated these shoots with. I see the project growing in the sense that I will continue to

create more inspiring work for different causes.

Lou&A: In your daughter's case, how did the experience change her — and change your relationship?

Rossi: I noticed that she loves doing shoots with me now and loves taking pictures just like Daddy does of her. It's really cute, especially because she now has a connection to what I do in my work life. It's another fun way to connect with her.

Lou&A: Do you ever feel like a superhero given the lives you've changed and if you could be a superhero, who would it be?

Rossi: (Laughs.) I don't feel like a superhero at all. I'm just taking photos of these kids — and they are the truly strong ones. I just want to help highlight them. And if I could be a superhero I'd be "Eat Everything You Want and Not Get Fat Man." Maybe that's kind of random ... but I guess it shows my Italian side. (Laughs.)

# Musical MILESTONES

Recently, we celebrated milestones of films that boast the talents of Italian-American actors. This month, we dive into the creative pool of Italian-American songwriters, musicians and singers.

Salvatore Guaragna shows up on nearly nobody's musical radar, and even the name Harry Warren doesn't ring as many bells as Irving Berlin or Hoagy Carmichael. But Guaragna, aka Warren, wrote the music to just as many American standards as those other guys. And the list of lyricists who worked with Warren reads like a "Who's Who" of the Songwriter's Hall of Fame, including Al Dubin, Mack Gordon, Johnny Mercer, Leo Robin and Ira Gershwin.

Warren always complained that he wasn't as well recognized as other top composers of the era, but the reason for that is two-fold. First of all, Warren was not a show writer. From the 1920s to 1950s, during the height of Warren's creative powers, songwriters who wrote Broadway shows were the respected artists in their field while Hollywood songwriters were their less regarded country cousins. Secondly, even though he worked within the Hollywood system, he wasn't a Hollywood player. He preferred to stay home evenings rather than make the rounds of the various parties thrown by movie stars and moguls.

Famous as or not as an individual, Warren penned melodies that are among the most memorable in the history of the Great American Songbook. Three of his hits are celebrating their 80th anniversaries in 2017: "Remember Me," "September in the Rain," and "With Plenty of Money and You."

In Max Wilk's 1973 book, "They're Playing Our Song," Warren recalled how producer Hall Wallis came to Warren and Durbin's to hear "With Plenty of Money and You." When they finished, Wallis said, "It stinks. Write a new song," and walked out of the room. The songwriters were furious, but rather than getting mad, they got even.



"Now we had to figure, how're we going to get the song in the picture?" told Wilk. "We knew Jack Warner and Hal Wallis were feuding. So we went up and said to Warner we wanted him to hear a song that Wallis didn't like. We played it. He said, 'That's swell! What the hell does he know about songs? Great, it goes in the picture!' That's how the song got into 'Gold Diggers of 1937."

Wallis ran Warner Brothers studio at the time but Jack Warner, as one of the brothers whose name was on the building, could override any Wallis veto. "With Plenty of Money and You" went on to be a hit for Henry Busse and his Orchestra.

Though he never achieved the fame of fellow songwriters like Irving Berlin and Hoagy Carmichael, he penned several classics that are celebrating major anniversaries this year.

As for Warren's other big songs of 1937, Crosby scored with "Remember Me," while Guy Lombardo's recording of "September in the Rain" was the most popular of them all. Through the years, "September in the Rain" has been recorded by everyone from Frank Sinatra and Rod Stewart to Annie Lennox and Doris Day.

By 1942, Warren had moved on to Twentieth Century Fox and, along with lyricist Mack Gordon, was writing songs for the endless parade of musicals the studio was producing with Alice Faye, Don Ameche, Cesar Romero, Betty Grable and their stable of musical comedy performers. "Orchestra Wives" was an unusual film for its time in that it took a somewhat serious look at the difficulties that musicians and their families faced while adjusting to a career that required so much time away from home. The story didn't win any awards but, as Tony Thomas noted in the 1975 book "Harry Warren and the Hollywood Musical," "If nothing else, 'Orchestra Wives' has the distinction of being the birthplace of three pop-song classics, 'I Got A Gal in Kalamazoo,' 'At Last,' and 'Serenade in Blue.'" All three of those

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classics celebrate their 75th anniversaries this year.

Warren's diamond jubilee gem, however, comes from an even more forgettable 1942 film titled "Iceland." Starring John Payne and Sonja Henie, the film is pure fluff, but the song "There Will Never Be Another You" continues to shine as one of the great American standards. Fellow composer Alec Wilder wrote in his seminal book on the art of songwriting, "American Popular Song," that this "may be the loveliest of all Warren songs. There's not a poorly chosen note in the melody. It's sinuous, graceful, gracious, sentimental, totally lacking in clichés."

"There Will Never Be Another You" was recorded by the Andrews Sisters, Woody Herman, Count Basie, Nat King Cole, Frank Sinatra, Doris Day and dozens of other celebrated musicians and vocalists. Ironically, it wasn't nominated for an Academy Award while "I've Got A

Gal in Kalamazoo" was. In the end, the oversight was moot as the Oscar for best song was awarded to Irving Berlin's sentimental favorite, "White Christmas."

In the first half of the 20th century, the success of songs was measured by sheet music sales as well as the box office take of the film or Broadway show that featured it. By the middle of the century, record sales and radio airplay emerged as the barometers of a song's popularity. Seventy years ago this summer, Perry Como enjoyed the fourth No. 1 hit of his career with the song, "Chibaba, Chi-baba (My Bambino Go To Sleep)." The song stayed atop the Billboard charts for three weeks. What was even more impressive is that the B-side of the record, "When You Were Sweet Sixteen," made it all the way to No. 2.

In 1952, Como notched another gold record with "Don't Let the Stars Get in Your Eyes," which reached No. 1 on the charts in both the U.S. and the U.K., remaining there for five weeks. Como scored his last No. 1 hit of the decade in 1957 with "Round and Round." All told, Como earned four chart-topping hits during the 1950s, with an astounding total of 23 recordings landing in the Billboard

Top Ten during a decade that gave birth to rock 'n' roll.

The golden anniversary tends to outshine all others, and there are myriad important recordings that were made by Italian-American artists in 1967. We start with a personal favorite, Henry Mancini's "Two for the Road," from the film of the same name starring Audrey Hepburn and Albert Finney. Mancini, who wrote the music (lyrics by Leslie Bricusse) and scored the film, was nominated for a Golden Globe for Best Original Score but failed to garner a nomination for the Grammy or Oscar: an unfortunate oversight as I think it was one of the most haunting melodies Mancini ever penned. It's also near and dear to my heart because the song was one of my mother's favorites.

Another film score that attracted a lot of attention in 1967 belonged to the big-budget musical "Doctor Dolittle."



The most recognizable tune to emerge from the talents of Lionel Newman, Alexander Courage and Leslie Bricusse was "Talk to the Animals." The song was an anthem to childhood for many adoring young fans in the late 1960s. One of the most popular adult singers of that, Bobby Darin, devoted an entire album to the songs from the film. Unfortunately, Darin's "Doctor Dolittle" album received little backing from the

Atlantic label and ended up being one of the rare failures in his career. In retrospect, it's a fascinating and fun album that proves that both Mr. Darin and the songs from the film continue to hold up very well.

It was unusual for a singer closely identified with a popular vocal group to



cut a solo record back in 1967, but
Frankie Valli did just that and ended up
with a huge hit with "Can't Take My
Eyes Off of You." The song fell just short
of the No. 1 position on the Billboard
chart. Nevertheless, it was hugely popular during 1967's "Summer of Love,"
and was revived 12 years later with its
prominent use in Michael Cimino's
landmark film about the Vietnam War
Era, "The Deer Hunter" (1978).

Yet another anthem of the day, "The Beat Goes On," premiered in 1967. Written by Sonny Bono, the song reached No. 6 on the Billboard charts and became the theme to Sonny and Cher's popular 1970s variety show. It captured the spirit of the time and must have held a special place in Bono's heart because the words "And the beat goes on" are inscribed on his tombstone.

Bobby Vee was one of the most successful Italian-American rock stars of the Pre-British Invasion era, but by 1967 he had gone five years without charting a top-10 song. In pop music, five years is an eternity. So when Vee's 1967 release, "Come Back When You Grow Up," climbed all the way to No. 3, it jumpstarted the rocker's career and kept him visible until the nostalgia craze took over in the 1970s, assuring Vee and his contemporaries a consistent place in the con-



cert tour circuit.

Perhaps the most strangely memorable hit of the 1967 pop music scene was "Something Stupid," sung by Nancy Sinatra and her daddy, Frank. This lament by a lover trying to win his way back into his sweetheart's good graces seemed an odd choice for a father-daughter duet, but there was no arguing with the results as the song skyrocketed to No. 1 on the Billboard Hot 100 chart and staved there for four solid weeks.

Sinatra fans might prefer to remember 1967 as the year he recorded two landmark albums that continue to impress half a century later. "Francis Albert Sinatra & Antonio Carlos Jobim" was the first of two albums Sinatra cut that year with the legendary Brazilian composer and singer. The second, "Sinatra-Jobim," wasn't released until 1969. In what was essentially "Frank Sinatra meets the bossa nova," the singer tenderly caresses the lyrics, singing more gently than he had since some of his early Dorsey ballads.

In "Sinatra: The Song Is You," Will Friedwald suggests that, although Sinatra was not the first American singer to embrace the genre (Ella Fitzgerald, Mel Torme, Eydie Gorme and Tony Bennett all experimented with bossa nova in the '60s), he distinguished himself by his considerable output.

"No American pop star would so thoroughly immerse himself in the world of bossa," wrote Friedwald. "He not only recorded two whole albums' worth of the stuff but sacrificed his signature stylistics in order to more smoothly fit into the new vernacular."

Both albums strayed from Sinatra's affinity for swinging big band arrangements and lush, string-infused ballads. In the end, it was a successful creative experiment that Sinatra fans warmly



received.

Sinatra began the year in the studio with the Jobim recordings and finished the year in the studio with another very different musical giant, Duke Ellington. Five years earlier, Sinatra had collaborated with big band legend Count Basie for the first time on a studio album, and the results were magnificent. They were so good, in fact, that Sinatra and Basie teamed up again on a 1964

album, and one more time on the live "Sinatra at the Sands" recording from 1966. This collaboration with Ellington, although not as well-received initially, definitely reflects the greatness of the two musical titans.

The arrangements are full, lush and loud — the absolute antithesis of the Jobim sessions. The Ellington Band differed from the Basie Band as well. Basie's group was a tight, swinging unit marked by a disciplined precision, while Ellington's group was a rich tapestry of unique soloists who could also blow the roof off the joint. However, as Will Friedwald cites in "The Song Is You," "the Duke and his men typically invested energy only in playing Ellington's and [Billy] Strayhorn's own music ... the band just didn't care to put any effort into the work of outside arrangers."

As initially conceived, the album was to be arranged by Strayhorn. Unfortunately, Strayhorn died after a long illness in May of 1967. Billy May, a fabulous big band arranger, was brought in to take over those duties. May and Strayhorn were both natives of Pittsburgh and May even sat in with a Strayhorn group back in the Steel City in the 1930s. Moreover, May's first arranging job was with the Charlie Barnet Band, which was known for its admiration of, and emulation of, the Ellington style. In short, May was perfect for the proj-

According to Friedwald, Sinatra and Ellington had a complex relationship. Sinatra had long wanted to record with Ellington. However, he'd also pursued Strayhorn to arrange an album for him for many years. Ellington, who was very proprietary about his musicians, nixed the deal by piling so much work on Strayhorn that he was unable to pursue

the Sinatra offer.

In the end, Sinatra's and Ellington's mutual respect was demonstrated when Ellington came over to Sinatra's Reprise label in 1962. Between 1962 and 1967, Ellington recorded more than 100 sides for the label, with some of the most memorable coming from this landmark session with Ol' Blue Eyes. All in all, 1967 was a very good year for the Hoboken saloon singer.



# Babbo NATALE

Babbo Natale is the Italian version of Santa Claus, but his real name is San Nicola Pastara di Licia, or Saint Nicholas. He was born in Turkev in the 3rd century A.D. and became the bishop of Myra in Asia Minor. His propensity for gift giving gave rise to the legend of Father Christmas, who children revere worldwide.

The real veneration of San Nicola dates back to 1087, when his bones were stolen from Myra by sailors from Bari, who were then rescued from a horrific sea storm due to the intercession of the saint. Since then, his feast day is celebrated on December 6, which also signals the start of the holiday baking season

Like American children, Italian children receive treats from San Nicola, and in years gone by they left their shoes by their beds in hopes that the saint would leave torrone, coins and oranges.

Biscotti make the perfect holiday gift, and the best part is that, from one basic dough, an array of different biscotti can be made ahead of time without much effort. To make the gift extra special, give them in clear cellophane bags tied with Christmas ribbons, or arrange them in gift boxes. And don't forget to leave a plate of biscotti out for Babbo Natale!

#### BISCOTTI DI NATALE

Christmas Biscotti Makes about 4 dozen

5 tablespoons unsalted butter. cut into bits

1-1/4 cups sugar

6 large eggs

3-1/4 cups unbleached all purpose flour

3-1/4 teaspoons baking powder

1/2 teaspoon salt

1 tablespoon vanilla extract

1 tablespoon brandy

4 tablespoons cocoa

1/2 cup diced dried fruit such as apricots,

cherries, raisins or figs

1/2 cup slivered almonds

1/2 cup chopped white chocolate

1/2 cup diced orange peel

Cream the butter and sugar in a stand mixer or in a bowl with a handheld mixer until the mixture is smooth and fluffy. Beat in the eggs one at a time on medium speed.

On a sheet of wax paper sift the flour, baking powder and salt together. Add the flour mixture to the butter mixture and blend well on medium speed.

Remove half of the dough from the mixer to a bowl. On low speed, blend the vanilla into the remaining dough in the mixer. Scoop the vanilla flavored dough onto a sheet of wax paper. Set aside.

Return the other batch of dough to the mixer and on low speed blend in the brandy and the cocoa until the dough is a uniform chocolate color. Scoop the dough out onto a second sheet of wax paper.

Wrap the dough balls well and refrigerate, allowing them to chill overnight or for at least 3 to 4 hours to make it easier to handle.

Remove the vanilla-flavored dough and divide it in half. To one half, mix in 1/2 cup of diced, dried, mixed fruits; to the other half, add 1/2 cup slivered almonds or hazelnuts.

Divide the chocolate dough in half. To one half, add chopped white chocolate; to the other half, add diced orange peel.

Roll the dough balls on a lightly floured surface into ropes about 12 to 14 inches long and 1-1/2 inches wide. Line baking sheets with parchment paper. Place two logs spaced 3 inches apart on each sheet.

Preheat the oven to 350 degrees. Bake the logs for about 12 to 15 minutes or until they are firm to the touch. Allow the logs to cool for 10 minutes before slicing them crosswise on the diagonal into 1/2-inch thick slices.

Place the biscotti back on the baking sheets and toast them in the oven for about 5 minutes, or until they lightly brown. Remove the biscotti to a rack to cool.

# Staples STAPLES

When my mother reminisced about the Christmases of her childhood, I was surprised to learn that no gifts or toys were part of the family celebration. Santa did not visit, except occasionally at the grammar school she attended, where children happily received oranges and walnuts from the jolly visitor. Many generations of children before and since associate those edible treats with Christmas. While today's youth are probably searching their stockings for electronic gifts, oranges and nuts were once exotic and expensive luxuries. The oranges were offered, usually in the toe of the stocking, as a nod to one of the legends associated with Saint Nicholas. It is said that the saint learned of a father who was desperate to find suitors for his three daughters. Because the man didn't have money for their dowries, he feared for their futures. Late one night, St. Nicholas went to their home and tossed



sacks of gold down the chimney for each girl. The legend says that the gold landed in their stockings, which were hanging by the fire to dry. Oranges, symbolizing golden balls, have been given as a reminder ever since. Many of this month's recipes feature oranges or nuts, still favorite Christmastime flavors. The first recipe is a different version of Biscotti di Regina than I have shared previously. It's from my friend Georgiana Faraci, who prefers her biscotti a little softer than some. Buone Feste a tutti!

#### BISCOTTI DI REGINA

(Sesame Seed Cookies)

2-1/2 cups all-purpose flour 1 teaspoon baking powder 1 stick butter 1 stick margarine 3/4 cup granulated sugar 3 eggs, separated 1/2 teaspoon pure vanilla extract Sesame seeds

Blend together the flour and baking powder. Set aside. Cream the butter, margarine and sugar. Add the egg yolks one at a time, and then add the vanilla extract. Gradually add the flour mixture. Beat the egg whites until frothy. Form rod-shaped cookies, rolling them by hand. Moisten each cookie with beaten egg white and then roll them in the sesame seeds. Bake in a preheated 350-degree oven for 12 to 15 minutes. Cool on wire racks.

#### BISCOTTI DI RICOTTA AL PROFUMO DI ARANCIA

(Orange-Scented Ricotta Cookies)

4-1/2 cups all-purpose flour
1 teaspoon baking powder
1 teaspoon baking soda
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/2 pound butter
2 cups sugar
2 eggs
1 pound ricotta, well-drained
1 teaspoon vanilla
Grated zest of 1 orange
Icing (recipe follows)

Sift together the flour, baking powder, baking soda and salt. Set aside. Cream the butter. Add the sugar and continue creaming. Add the eggs one at a time until blended. Add the ricotta, vanilla and orange zest. Beat well. Add the flour mixture gradually. Drop rounded teaspoons of dough on parchment-lined baking sheets. Bake in a preheated 350-degree oven about 10 minutes until edges are lightly browned. Cool.

Icing:
2 cups confectioners' sugar
1/4 cup softened butter
3 tablespoons milk
1/2 teaspoon vanilla
1/2 teaspoon orange extract (or to taste)
Additional orange zest

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Mix the first five ingredients well and use to frost the cookies. Sprinkle the grated orange zest over the cookies before the icing dries.

Variation: Omit the orange zest topping. After frosting each cookie, drizzle with a thin stream of melted dark chocolate.

#### QUARESIMALI

(Chocolate Spice Cookies)

4 cups flour

1-1/2 cups sugar

1/2 cup cocoa

2 tablespoons instant coffee

1/2 teaspoon nutmeg

1/2 teaspoon cinnamon

1/2 teaspoon cloves

1 tablespoon baking powder

1-1/2 sticks margarine

1 cup milk

2 eggs

1/2 teaspoon almond extract

1/2 teaspoon lemon extract

1/2 teaspoon orange extract

1 cup broken walnuts or chopped toasted almonds

Icing (recipe follows)

Put the first eight ingredients in a large bowl and stir until all are well blended. Add the margarine and work with your fingers until a crumbly mixture, resembling cornmeal, is achieved.

Make a well in the center and add all the remaining ingredients except icing. Stir with a large wooden spoon to combine and dampen all the ingredients. The dough will be heavy and sticky to work with. Cover it and refrigerate for 2 or 3 hours.

Scoop by the teaspoon full or shape

into balls and place on greased cookie sheets about 1-1/2 inches apart. Bake in a preheated 375-degree oven for about 10 minutes. Remove them from the cookie sheets to cool on racks. When all are cool, line them very closely on wax paper and ice them.

Icing and Decoration:
Hot milk or water
3 cups sifted confectioners' sugar
1-1/2 teaspoons anise extract
Chocolate shot (optional)

Slowly mix hot milk or water with the sifted confectioners' sugar until the frosting is spreadable. Stir in the extract and ice the cookies with a pastry brush. If desired, sprinkle them with chocolate shots before the icing dries. When the icing is completely dry, store them in tightly covered containers.

#### BISCOTTI AL BURRO DI MIRTILLI

(Cranberry Butter Cookies)

2 cups all-purpose flour
1/4 teaspoon baking powder
1/8 teaspoon salt
1 cup butter, softened
3/4 cup confectioners' sugar
2 teaspoons vanilla extract
1/2 teaspoon almond extract

1 tablespoon grated orange zest, or to taste

2 cups sweetened dried cranberries, chopped

Mix the flour, baking powder and salt together and set aside. In the bowl of an electric mixer, cream the butter and confectioners' sugar. Beat in the extracts and zest. Gradually add the dry ingredients until just incorporated. Fold in the chopped cranberries, mixing them evenly



throughout the dough. Divide the dough into two equal portions and roll each one into a 7-inch log. Wrap in wax paper or plastic wrap and refrigerate at least 4 hours. Slice the logs into 1/2-inch thick slices and place on cookie sheets about 1 inch apart. Bake in a preheated 350-degree oven for about 10 minutes, until firm but not browned. Cool on wire racks and store in a cookie tin.

#### BISCOTTI CON Noci e marmellata

(Walnut Jam Cookies)

1/2 cup butter, softened
1/4 cup granulated sugar
1 egg, separated
1/2 teaspoon vanilla extract
1 cup all-purpose flour
1/4 teaspoon salt
3/4 cup finely chopped walnuts
Thick jam or marmalade

Cream the butter and sugar, then add the egg yolk, reserving the egg white. Blend in the vanilla extract. Combine the flour with the salt and add to the creamed mixture, mixing





well. If the dough seems soft, refrigerate briefly. Shape the dough into small balls. Whisk the reserved egg white until frothy. Roll each ball in the egg white and then in the walnuts. Place two inches apart on lightly greased cookie sheets or on baking sheets lined with parchment paper. Using your thumb, make an indentation in the center of each cookie. Fill with your favorite jam or marmalade. Bake in a preheated 350-degree oven for 12 to 14 minutes, until golden brown. Let the cookies cool slightly before moving the cookie racks.

#### SALAME AL CIOCCOLATO

(Chocolate "Salami")

1/2 cup slivered almonds 1/2 cup chopped walnuts Two 5-inch-long plain biscotti, coarsely crushed 6 tablespoons unsalted butter, at room temperature 12-ounce bag semisweet chocolate morsels 1/4 cup brewed coffee 1 teaspoon grated orange zest 1/2 cup confectioners' sugar

Position a rack in the center of the oven and preheat the oven to 350 degrees. Spread the almonds, walnuts and crushed biscotti in a single layer on a baking sheet. Bake until the nuts are lightly toasted, 6 to 8 minutes. Cool completely.

Cut the butter into 1/2-inch pieces. Put the butter and chocolate in a heatproof medium bowl and place the bowl over a pan of barely simmering water. Stir until the chocolate has melted and the mixture is smooth, about 6 minutes. Stir in the coffee until smooth. Add the almonds, walnuts, biscotti pieces and orange zest, and stir until combined. Cover the bowl and refrigerate until firm but moldable, about 2 hours.

Divide the chocolate mixture in half. Place half of the mixture in the center of an 18-inch-long piece of plastic wrap. Using a spatula, form the mixture into a log about 7 inches long and 2 inches in diameter. Roll up the log in the plastic and twist the ends to seal. Roll back and

forth on a work surface a few times to make the log evenly round. Repeat with the remaining chocolate mixture. Refrigerate the logs until firm, at least 2 hours.

Spread the confectioners' sugar on a dinner plate. Remove the plastic wrap from the logs and roll them in the sugar until coated. Using a pastry brush, brush away the excess sugar. Let the logs sit at room temperature for 15 minutes. Use a sharp serrated knife to cut the logs into 1/2-inch-thick slices.

#### BISCOTTI DI SPEZIE **E MANDORLA**

(Almond Spice Biscotti)

3/4 cup slivered almonds, toasted 2-3/4 cups all-purpose flour 1-1/2 teaspoons baking powder 1/4 teaspoon salt 2 teaspoons cinnamon 1/2 teaspoon cloves 1/4 teaspoon nutmeg 1 stick butter, softened 1/2 cup granulated sugar 1/2 cup brown sugar 2 eggs 3 tablespoons orange juice 1 teaspoon orange zest Egg wash

Toast the slivered almonds in a preheated 275-degree oven until lightly golden, about 20 minutes. Cool. In a small bowl, combine the flour, baking powder, salt and spices. Set aside.

In the bowl of an electric mixer,



cream the butter and sugars. Add the eggs, one at a time, and then beat in the orange juice and zest. Reduce the mixer speed and gradually add the flour mixture until well combined. Stir in the toasted almonds by hand. Refrigerate for one hour.

Divide the dough into four parts. Lightly flour your hands and roll each piece into a snake about 12 inches long. Place on two lightly greased air-cushioned baking sheets. Flatten slightly to form 4 loaves, about 1-1/2 inches across.

Beat an additional egg with 2 teaspoons of water and brush a little on the surface of each loaf. Bake in a preheated 375-degree oven for 20 to 22 minutes, until lightly golden. Cool for about 15 to 20 minutes, and then slice diagonally into 1/2-inch biscotti. Lower the oven temperature to 300 degrees. Return the biscotti slices to the oven and bake about 5 minutes per side. If you prefer harder biscotti, you may bake them longer. I prefer them softer. Sometimes I omit the second baking, since they will get a little harder after a day or two. Cool on wire racks.

When flavoring your baked goods with vanilla extract, be sure to purchase pure vanilla extract. The artificially flavored extract is less expensive but quite inferior. There is a wide selection of other extracts to enhance your cookies, including almond, orange and anise. If a recipe calls for anise oil, it is not wise to substitute. The oil is much stronger in flavor.

# Deep and diverse ROOTS

The Sicilian city of Modica is a unique example of cultural cross-pollination and adaptation. Scattered across a hillside in the southeastern part of the island, this municipality of over 50,000 has been around since the Neolithic period (3,000 B.C.), but didn't really see a boost in its development until the late Middle Ages.

The first traces of its written history go back to a period of Phoenician domination that ended with Rome's assault on nearby Siracusa in 213-212 B.C. Squabbles between local leaders, which even attracted the attention of Cicero, pushed the town to the verge of starvation after farmers were killed or forced

to flee the area.

After passing through the hands of Arabs and Normans, the city was held by various Spanish rulers for centuries. Modica gradually grew into a vital cultural epicenter, although one of the city's darkest moments took place in the same period. On August 15, 1474, when Christians celebrate the Day of the Assumption, an angry mob stormed the Jewish ghetto, killing at least 350 people. The massacre was the tipping point for many Jewish communities throughout the region, who had been isolated and persecuted, leading to a mass exodus from many towns, including Modica. During the 15th century,

many schools started sprouting around Modica, founded by various orders of monks. These attracted students from across Europe, and Modica grew to become the fourth largest academic center in Sicily.

After a long period of reconstruction following a devastating earthquake in 1693, Modica never fully regained its status, but remained an important destination for learning. Nowadays, the city is renown for its chocolate, which is still produced following an ancient Aztec tradition imported by Modica's Spanish rulers. The city recently requested a protected status for its chocolate from the European Union.












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
