





And let's not forget those like Amadeo Giannini, founder of the Bank of Italy (today Bank of America) although not a Nobel laureate, was an economist and philanthropist who improved so many lives and supported projects to help evervone.

The Italian genius, benevolence, and determination have spread far and wide, in places we may have not even heard of. That genius and determination were carried "across the Pond", as they say, to leave us with a legacy and model to be proud of and emulate.

"YOUTH MEMBER" mentioned or used to identify a specific age group. Per the Constitution - "Article IV - Membership, Section 2 – Individual:

2b. "That they are persons at least eighteen (18) years of age who are of Italian origin..."

Section 3. "Membership in chapters shall be designated as Active, Honorary, Associates or ACES."

SO PLEASE REMEMBER, ALL MEM-BERS 18 YEARS AND OLDER HAVE EQUAL RIGHTS!

There should be no other delineation of age except for application fee and annual dues for our 18-25-year-old mem-

To all Chapter Presidents: Please include, if not already doing so, your members ages 18-25 at your General Meetings and events as you would do for all other members. Allow them to express and share their ideas, visions and values. Our younger members will be our future leaders. Encourage their involvement, embrace and respect their generation. A perfect recipe for our success is the blending of our generations!

If our younger members feel comfortable to speak up on issues and share ideas to help move our organization forward and their voices are heard, they will feel appreciated as a valued member of their chapter, thus wanting to maintain their membership.

In Memorium: UNICO National President 1988 Frank Castrignano



Frank Castrignano of Swoyersville, PA passed away Friday, Oct. 29, 2021.


He was born Sept. 21, 1925, in Wilkes-Barre, a son of the late Dominic Castrignano and Marie Lauzano.

He is survived by his wife of 66 years, Louise DeAngelo; brothers, Dominic Castrignano and wife, Sandra; and Michael "Mickey" Castrignano; three sons, Dominic, Anthony and wife, Sheri, and Frank and wife, Debra Castrignano; six grandchildren, Dominic, Frank, Danielle, Destiny, Stephanie and Jaclyn Castrignano; and three great-grandchildren, Kallista, Thomas John "TJ" and Brynlee.

Frank attended GAR High School. He joined the U.S. Merchant Marines during World War II, during which two ships he was aboard sunk in the Atlantic Ocean. He then went on to serve in the Navy during the Korean War.

Frank was a life member of the Knights of Columbus, in which he was a 4th degree knight. He was also a life member of the Sons and Daughters of Italy. Frank's real love was UNICO. He was the local chapter president and chairman for many charity events. He became UNICO national president in charge of all the chapters in the United States. He was also the owner of a garment factory in Swoyersville for over 40 years.














Chapter Spotlight:







COMUNICO RULES AND GUIDELINES

The following are ComUNICO Rules that must be strictly adhered to in order for a Chapter and/or a Committee's submissions to be included in an issue of ComUNICO:

- 1. Each Chapter is limited to 300 words per issue. This includes the number of words in a column and captions.
- 2. The only titles to be included in captions are for National Officers and Chapter Presidents. Do not identify other Chapter Officers by title.
- 3. If more than 10 people appear in a picture, do not identify each of them.
- 4. Abbreviations are not to be used. The only title to be abbreviated is Vice President (VP).
- 5. All articles and captions are to be submitted in Times New Roman font, 11 point font size and in black.

- 6. Photo File Name should be identifiable to the corresponding caption.
- 7. A Chapter is allowed a maximum of six pictures per issue for a regular event.
- 8. All award recipients (ie. Scholarship, Brian Piccolo) should be included in one picture. Do not send multiple pictures from an event with one recipient per picture.
- 9. Only pictures attached to an e-mail will be accepted. Pictures embedded in an e-mail will be returned to the Chapter and not included.
- 10. All submissions should be sent to comUNICO@UNICO.org. Submissions sent to any other office e-mail address will not be included.
- 11. The deadline for submissions is 5:00 PM on the designated day.

- 12. Photos coming in after a holiday will not be included in the next issue, if deemed to be untimely. ComUNICO should reflect the current time of year.
- 13. Articles cannot contain copyrighted materials. All articles must be original and completely written by the person submitting the article. An article compiled from information that was cut and pasted from other sources is considered plagiarism.

The following are ComUNICO Guidelines for a Chapter to follow:

- 1. Photos should be sent in landscape not portrait form.
- 2. Do not send in blurry pictures.
- 3. Review all submissions prior to sending for grammar and punctuation.






In an effort to promote the UNICO National name, the Executive Committee has agreed to order magnets and decals with the UNICO logo for all of the membership.


